Thank you for your interest in the Montgomery County Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES®).

What is ARES® ?

The Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES®), as stated in the [American Radio Relay League \(ARRL\) Public Service Communications Manual](#) ". . . consists of licensed amateurs who have voluntarily registered their qualifications and equipment for communications duty in the public service when disaster strikes. Every licensed amateur, regardless of membership in the ARRL or any other local or national organization, is eligible for membership in the ARES. The only qualification other than possession of an Amateur Radio license is a sincere desire to serve. The possession of emergency-powered equipment is desirable, but is not a requirement for membership." ([FSD-235](#) , 2/96, Page 8)

In the State of Ohio, counties are grouped together into ten (10) ARES Districts. Each District has a District Emergency Coordinator (DEC) appointed. Montgomery County is a part of District 3 along with Champaign, Clark, Darke, Greene, Miami, Preble and Shelby counties. Each county has an Emergency Coordinator appointed by the Section Manager.

Membership

To become a member in **Montgomery County ARES**, the applicant must hold a valid Amateur Radio Operator License, possess a serious interest in providing emergency communications (community service), and (with a few exceptions) reside within Montgomery County, Ohio. However, with the approval of the District Emergency Coordinator (DEC) and the Emergency Coordinator (EC) of the individual's home County, that person may become part of the Montgomery County ARES Team. Each member is asked to update their membership application annually so that accurate equipment, license and training records are maintained.

The members in **Montgomery County ARES** are divided into **Active** and **Reserve** member groups. *Active* members are those individuals who have completed or will complete the recommended training and will participate frequently in membership meetings, nets, trainings, drills and community service events; where employment and/or retirement provide for frequent event participation. *Reserve* members have a significant interest in the organization's mission, support it where they can, but for various reasons, are unable to meet *ALL* the participation requirements for *Active* membership. Reserve Members, by reason of not having the same training and experience as Active members, will not have the same responsibilities as an Active member and are not eligible to hold leadership positions in the organization. However, they may be given other duties once their talents are identified. Reserve members will be required, on occasion, to reaffirm their commitment to the organization by participating in some activity or event.

Active members are issued a Montgomery County ARES photo ID badge. Color coded markings will be fixed to the photo ID badges to indicate the level of training received. Red will indicate that none of the required training has been completed. Yellow will indicate that the ARRL's Intro to Emergency Communication - Level 1/Basic course has been completed. Green will indicate that the ARRL's Intro to Emergency Communications – Level 1/Basic course has been completed as well as the Federal Emergency Management Agency's IS-100, 200, 700, 800 on-line courses.

"Temporary" or "Restricted" IDs will be issued to our temporary volunteers. These IDs must be returned at the end of the event.

The Montgomery County ARES application (FSD-98) can be found on the MoCo ARES website. You have the options of: 1) Filling the application out online, OR 2) Download the application and send it in via the mail or electronically.

Participation

Membership in **Montgomery County ARES**, carries with it significant personal responsibility. One of which is finding the time to participate in our activities. When not actually engaged in an emergency situation, members must continually assess their communications skills and the availability of their equipment to successfully serve the organization's mission.

Some organizational positions carry a greater personal commitment for regular participation than as an active member. So as to set the example for the rest of the membership, the Emergency Coordinator and his/her staff are expected to attend most

meetings, check-in to most nets, and participate often in public service activities. *Key Members* may remain in their assigned positions only as long as they are able to fulfill their delegated roles.

Ultimately, the strength of **Montgomery County ARES** depends entirely upon the determination of all of its volunteer members to contribute their time and communication skills frequently for the overall good of the organization.

In accordance with **The Amateur's Code** published by the ARRL in their Handbook, "*The Amateur is Balanced...Radio is his/her hobby.* He/she never allows it to interfere with any of the duties he/she owes to his/her home, his/her job, his/her school, or his/her community." This important point should never be overlooked!

After the needs of your home, job, or school have been satisfied, you should then consider how you could best serve the needs of your community. Providing communications support to the local community, through regular **Montgomery County ARES** participation is an excellent and rewarding way of giving something back to your community.

It cannot be over-emphasized that regular membership participation is of extreme importance to the success of this organization! We are all volunteers who have freely accepted a commitment to community service. Any individual, who joins **Montgomery County ARES**, must understand that he/she is expected to participate frequently in public service events, membership meetings, nets and have completed the recommended training. We must be able to count on you to be a well-trained team player! A personal commitment to public service is a requirement and must be assured before accepting Active membership status. Any Active member who is unable to participate in at least 2 annual membership meetings, 1 net a quarter, 1 or 2 public service events a year, and has not completed the recommended training will be reclassified as an Reserve member. Thereafter, if regular participation is not reestablished through participation, the Reserve member will be removed from the membership roster.

Training

Amateur Radio Operators that are going to provide emergency communications for a served agency are encouraged (as it may be a mandatory requirement) to have training in the areas of Incident Command System and National Incident Management System (NIMS). The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has four online courses that can be taken: IS-100.a Introduction to Incident Command System, IS-200.a ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents, IS-700.a National Incident Management System (NIMS) and IS-800.b National Response Plan. Where FEMA courses exist in more than one current version – aimed at somewhat different audiences – any one of the currently available versions will suffice.

Active Montgomery County ARES members are encouraged to take at a minimum the ARRL's Intro to Emergency Communication - Level 1/Basic (EC-001) Course to get a better understanding of Emergency Communications. A moderate fee is required for the courses and books. For those seeking leadership and management roles in ARES, ARRL has developed a new online course entitled Public Service and Emergency Management for Radio Amateurs (EC-016). Training sessions, nets, drills (Simulated Emergency Test, Field Day) and public service events are scheduled throughout the year. Active participation in these types of events will only enhance your communication skills and prepare you for when a disaster does strike.

ARES/SKYWARN Activation/Notification – Priority Traffic Mailing Lists

In the event of a Montgomery County ARES or Skywarn activation, there is a mailing list available called the Montgomery County Priority Traffic List (MOCOPT) to notify you.

This is a limited mailing list for messages that, as the stated in the title, are of a **Priority** nature.

Type of traffic would be ARES Net activation's, SKYWARN activation's, placing operators on stand-by, or other important information. It will also be used during exercises when it would be appropriate if the situation was real.

It will **NOT** be used for routine things such as test sessions, radio equipment for sale, meeting announcements or general questions. Please direct those to the Miami Valley Amateur Radio Bulletin Board (MVARBB) or other normal channels.

The idea is to get information to people, that for one reason or another, do not want a lot of the routine messages, such as those with limited e-mail access, cell phones, pagers, or want to monitor from a work account.

Posting is restricted. **ONLY** designated persons will be able to post. The posters are limited to the District Emergency Coordinator (DEC), Montgomery County Emergency Coordinator (EC) and designated Assistant Emergency Coordinators (AEC), Montgomery County Office of Emergency Management and Dayton Skywarn.
